
Refugee in need of accommodation

Participants Wanted

Villa maria Catholic Homes and the Cognition and Emotion Research Centre based out of Australian Catholic University are looking for people to try something new. We're looking for new participants to take part in our research study, Memory Train.

One of the hardest parts of running a research study is conecting with the wider community and finding those individuals who are interested in taking part in research. We were wondering if there would be an opportunity to share a little about Memory Train with your Parish attendees.

The Memory Train research project is looking at how brain training may improve memory in adults ages 60 and above. The study involves six weeks of training which is completed in the participant's home on the days of their choice. There are a couple of sessions before and after training to determine whether the training has had any effect.

Everything will be provided to complete the tasks. Some tasks require participants to use a computer, but we stress that participants don't need any computer knowledge or to even own a computer to complete the study. The researchers will guide the participants through the study and offer phone support along the way.





Right into the twenty-first century scholars have examined what St Augustine of Hippo (354–430) taught on the Trinity, freewill and grace, the interpretation of Scripture, the sacraments, and other central themes of Chris-tian faith. Surprisingly, his teaching on Christ's resurrection from the dead has been long neglected. This book aims to fill this important gap. Gerald O'Collins first sets out what Augustine preached and wrote about Christ's personal rising from the dead and about the historical and existential evidence for accepting the resurrection. The second half of the book takes up the enduring significance of this teaching and apologetic and, where necessary, updates Augustine's account of Christ's resurrection. Now resident scholar at Jesuit Theological College (Parkville, Vic), O'Collins has authored or co-authored nearly seventy books, including eight on the resurrection.
