

During the week Fr. Elligate hosted an appreciation dinner for the long-standing contributions by The St Carthage's Music Group. Back in the late fifties St Carthage's was one of the first parishes in Melbourne given permission for a Sunday evening Mass. Two priest residents in the parish were chaplains to the Royal Melbourne Hospital.

There was a request from nurses to have a late afternoon Mass as some had been on night duty the previous evening.

In the 1960's we saw the emergence of "Folk Masses" which appealed to young people. Guitars replaced organs in Churches and a modern style called folk music replaced traditional hymns.

Gradually University students attended this Mass and our parish register indicates many students married here after graduation.

For well over thirty years Roger Rassool and his wife Anne have gathered a group of singers together. The group lead Masses at Christmas & Easter and on one Sunday evening each month.

The group gathered recently at Piccolo Mondo on Lygon Street Carlton to celebrate their friendship and contribution to music at St Carthage's Parish.





Conscience is the basic human faculty for living a Christian moral life. The concern is how to appropriately form a Christian conscience.


The emphasis in the Spiritual Exercises on the love for God and others in the journey of following Christ helps to form the Christian conscience to reach maturity.
