

Guest Reflection Speakers

This week's guest speaker is John D'Arcy May whose topic is:

Three Faiths, One God - Why Aren't We Closer?

A short bio:

John May and his wife Margret have been attending St Carthages since coming to Melbourne after 23 years in Dublin seven years ago. John has worked in ecumenical settings all his life, in Germany and PNG before joining the Irish School of Ecumenics in 1987. He now lives in retirement near Geelong.

Last week's Guest Speaker

Last week barrister Mark Perica, who often appears before an ILO agency dealing with the rights of international workers, invited us to reflect as consumers on human exploitation and cruelty behind the manufacture and supply of some products from Asia. He gave chilling examples of slavery in the Thai fishing industry (which supplies 30% of Australia's fish consumption), how sick or injured workers are killed, and the lack of safety or accountability in one of India's Special Economic Zones largest auto manufacturing plants (Tata). What can we do? asked Mark.



Firstly, encourage the growth of ethical markets by choosing to buy products made with proven respect for their workers. Secondly, refuse to buy where you know or suspect the supply chain is exploiting or harming people. Thirdly, do your research – check the internet to find out where products come from and what is known about their producers' ethical practices.
