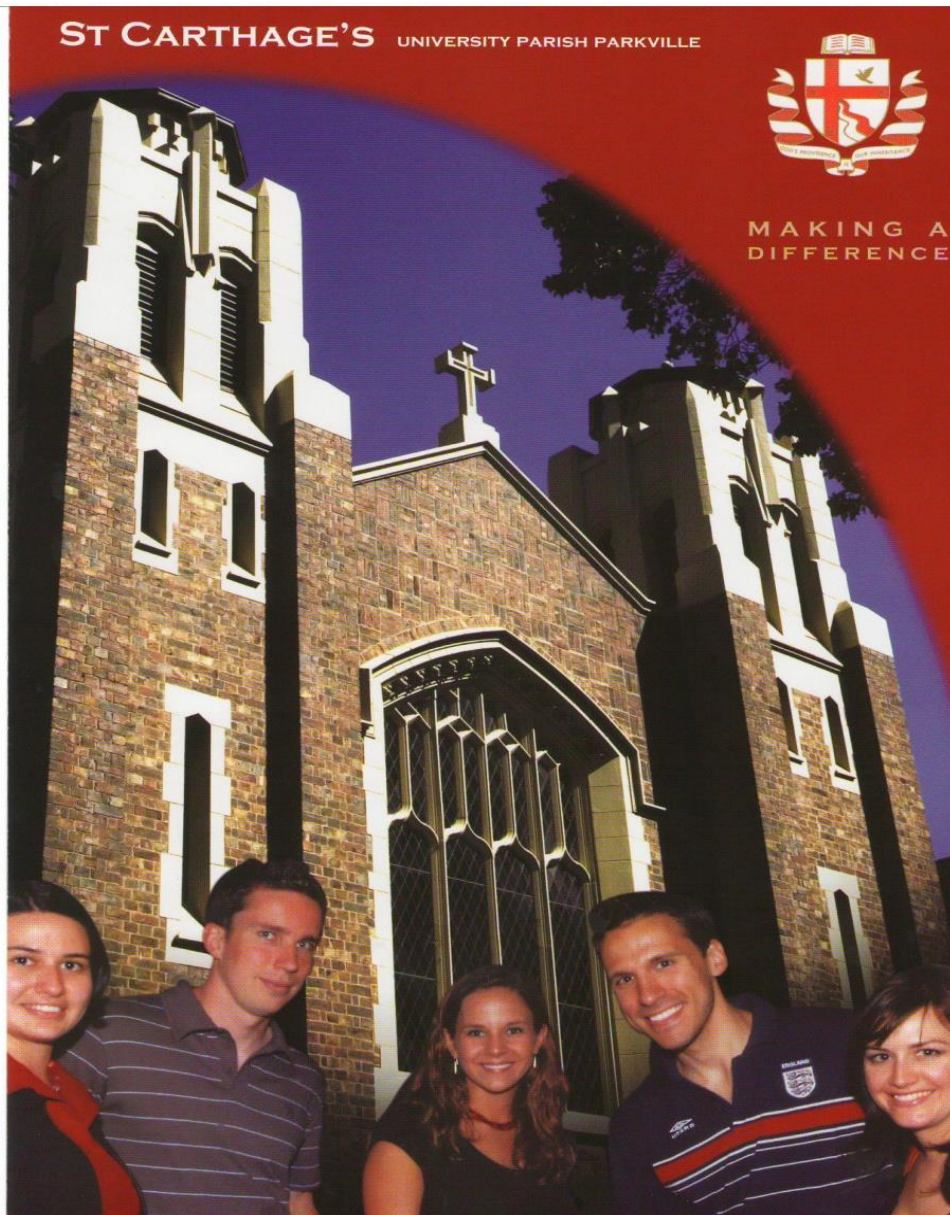

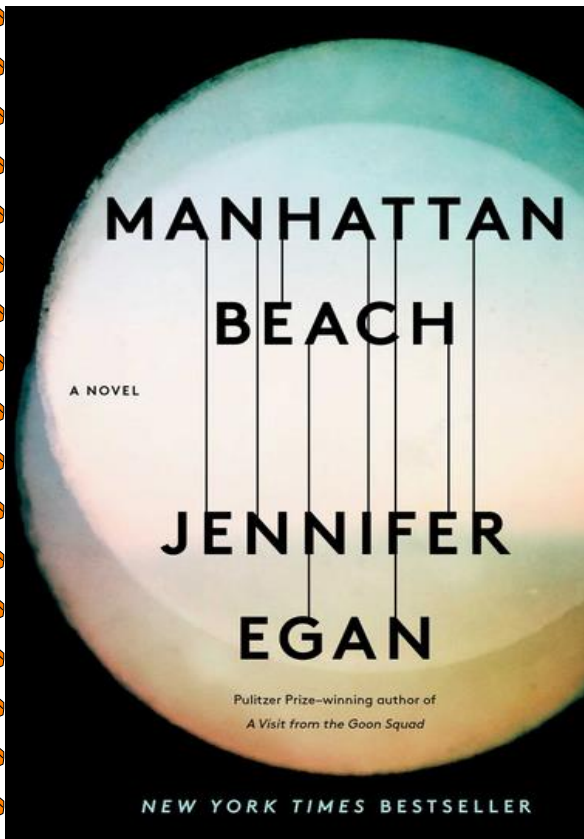

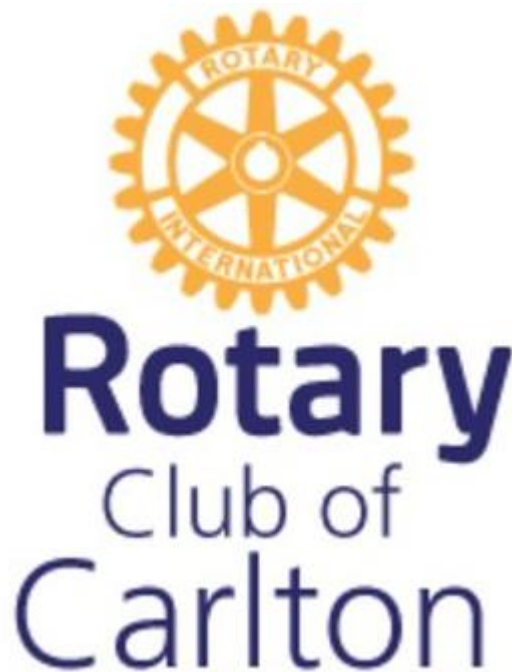

National Apology

Dear Friends,

On Monday 22 October 2018 at 11:00am, our Prime Minister will deliver a National Apology to Victims and Survivors of Institutional Child Sexual Abuse, which will acknowledge the painful truth which was uncovered through the work of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. The Nation's apology will give expression for our own institution's appalling failures. We stand in solidarity in expressing words of apology to those whose lives have been beset by the turmoil inflicted upon them when they were innocent and vulnerable children.

We are very grateful to Cathy Jenkins, Director – Archbishop's Office for Evangelisation, for preparing a resource which you will find helpful in your pastoral setting. The resource provides a framework for your own community to participate in solidarity by giving expression through silence, words of acknowledgement, prayer and ritual action.

May the National Apology bring a sense of profound acknowledgement to the thousands of Australians whose stories have now been told and those still too afraid to speak, of our collective sorrow, sadness and sincere apology.

May our humble prayers help to provide the gift of healing for those who have longed to hear these words.

We place our trust in Christ Jesus who is our light and promise.
