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Email from Fr. Michael Elligate to Mark Dohrmann

6 June 2019

Dear Mark,

The last thing in my mind is to control anyone particularly the parish or specific parishioners. This is the chronology of the event.

I attended The Wheeler Centre last Tuesday evening as I had read Martels book some weeks ago and thought he had done some valuable research.

I would have put the event in the newsletter, but when I rang to book I was told I gained one of the last tickets.

I met about a dozen parishioners there.

I think Margaret Rush who seems to be on The Wheeler Centre news bulletin told some people in the parish and that is how I found out.

After the gathering Maryna Mews was very excited. After his engaging presentation she spoke to him in French about a whole range of historical and literary matters. She then suggested he come to St Carthages and speak if he had time.

Both Constant and Maryna emailed me that evening with enthusiastic feelings. I instantly returned the email and suggested next Tuesday evening. I suggested a gathering in the presbytery, not the Church, simply because I did not want to tangle with the Archbishop who recently and unfortunately stopped Joan Chittister from speaking publicly at a public forum next year. I thought the best way to go was to invite interested people to have a gathering for around thirty in the house. This was not to control or to exercise clericalism, it was my move to keep the parish in good view so that parishioners may soon meet on friendly terms with the Archbishop indicating the sort of PP they wish to succeed me. You may have a style of confrontation. My claim, I'm certain, held by an overwhelming number of parishioners, is that my own style in avoiding aggressive tactics has led to a remarkably strong parish, perhaps one of the most enriching parishes in Melbourne. I heard Frederich's visit and the St Carthages conversation event being talked about at the very successful lay run Spirituality in the Pub last night.

Today I saw your notice in the weekly circular and realised that it had to be in the Church as the advertising will inform many that it is on. I will advertise the event in the Church at all Masses this weekend.

If there is a backlash from the Archbishop I will take it.

You may read all this as another example of my obsessive need to control things. Maybe it is you who have the problem. Would you like to take charge of the place and run it your way? I suggest you circulate this letter on your weekly list.

Then we can bring the parish together at a General Meeting and see just where the parishioners believe the problem lies.
