

Francis J. Moloney, SDB, AM, FAHA, has had a long career as a Roman Catholic Priest and a scholar. A Salesian of Don Bosco (SDB) since 1960, he has studied at the Salesian Pontifical
University, the Pontifical Biblical Institute, both in Rome, and at the University of Oxford. He has taught in Europe, Israel, the USA, South East Asia, and Australia. Foundation Professor of Theology

at Australian Catholic University (1994-1999), Dean and Professor of New Testament at the Catholic University of America (1999-2005), Professor Moloney is author of many books and shorter studies, both scholarly and popular. The state honour of Member or the Order of Australia (AM), and his election as a Fellow of the Australian Academy of the Humanities (FAHA) are recognitions of his life-long contribution to Australian culture and Religion. He is currently a Senior Professorial Fellow at the Catholic Theological College in Melbourne, Australia, part of the ecumenical University of Divinity.

# Last weekend I stated "With regret I have been put in a position that I must say something about a persistent critical voice in the Parish. This critical voice says I am running a cult rather than a healthy parish. He also says I am obsessed with controlling all matters to do with the parish life. In his mind I am embedded in clericalism. I have no wish to humiliate anyone, but for at least two years I have graciously put snide statements about my integrity and role as Parish Priest aside. Now I must name these matters so that intelligent and faithed people can make up their own minds about such things. I would hope this is the last time I have to speak about such unpleasant matters."

Mark Dohrmann to members of the Parish Steering Committee after Fr. Elligate departed for annual holidays in 2016 –

"Michael has made the parish the way it is – yes, sermons which assist, good liturgies, open door at the church, etc. However, the greater part of the numbers attending are probably best described as "consumers". They come, they listen, they like, they go. Michael has them in his thrall. There is no stimulus for reform or change coming from the top, and volunteering levels are pretty abysmal.

That's the sort of parish it has been made into, and it has attracted participants suited by what's on offer. There are other types of parish which have different priorities, visions, governance structures and cultures which are quite different from us. The timing for reform is fortuitous. We are challenged by the Royal Commission and its recommendations to face quite fundamental group-up changes, and to grasp the nettle.

Depending on what we want a renewed parish to be, we may need to talk about a range of things (top of my head): welcomes, inclusion of individuals, friendship opportunities, relation with the University (Where did this theme come from?), families' involvement, pastoral workers, asylum seekers, use of the parish house, a parish response to the Royal Commission, online communications, home visits, lay leadership, lay formation, etc etc."
