



In the Listening and Dialogue stage of Plenary Council 2020, you will recall that 26 parishes in and near Melbourne came together in May 2019 to make a joint statement on the key issues that need to be addressed in PC2020, in addition to making their individual parish submissions. We sent the statement to every Bishop in Australia, Leaders of Religious Orders Australia (CRA), as well as the Plenary Council Committee. There has been a very positive response to this statement from many sources, including a number of parishes, Bishops Paul Bird of Ballarat and Tim Harris of Townsville, Sister Patty Fawkner, Congregational Leader of the Sisters of the Good Samaritan, Fr Noel Connolly from the Plenary Council Committee and a wide range of other individuals.

This note is to invite all of you to consider a second stage of that initiative, as the PC2020 process has itself moved into the Listening and Discernment stage. The suggestions made below are provided only for discussion by the collaborating parishes, and sketch one option for a second stage initiative, building on what has already been achieved.

Underlying Premises

Two premises underlie the proposal for a second stage. The first is that there is a strong, shared view among many committed, rank-and-file Catholics – lay parishioners and their priests – about the key changes that need to be addressed in the Australian Church in 2019 and 2020. Our understanding of this shared view is briefly summarised in the Joint Statement of May 2019. The second is that making this shared view of the necessary reforms more explicit, better understood and more widely dispersed may help to shape the outcomes at PC2020.

*********** **Objectives**

The proposed second stage initiative would have three objectives:

i. To make the support among the faithful for this shared view more explicit, by seeking support for the May 2019 statement from a wide range of parishes across Australia.

ii. To provide more detailed documentation and support for each of the nine propositions.

iii. To publicise this shared view more widely, and to draw the attention of Church leaders - bishops, priests, religious and lay - to it and to the need to take seriously the sensus fidelium.

Means

Some of the means that might be adopted to achieve these objectives are as follows:

i. Establish a new website for this joint initiative, as a vehicle whereby it can be publicised and further support documented.

ii. Send further letters and hold further conversations with other parishes, including seeking supporters in other regions that might canvas support in those regions.

iii. Pursue a range of publications (for example in "The Swag", "Eureka St" and "La Croix") to explain the initiative.

iv. Seek high level theological and other input to strengthen the analysis.

v. Establish personal contact with key figures, such as Vincent Long, Francis Sullivan and so on, to obtain their input to the best way forward.

vi. An international body, "Voices of Faith" have asked to put our statement on their website "overcomingsilence.com"


Vote on the Parish Council Constitution on Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 July 2019 masses

Following a review of your feedback on the exposure draft of the Constitution the interim Parish Council has agreed to put a final version of it to a vote. Copies will be available from the porch of the Church. Rule 11 of the Constitution requires that parishioners receive 21 days' notice of a meeting to adopt the Constitution. We therefore notify you that at each of the three masses on Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 July a member of the Parish Council will attend and conduct a vote by show of hands on the following resolutions:

- 1. Approve the terms of the Constitution circulated to us; and
