

This Weekend

Following a review of your feedback on the exposure draft of the Constitution the interim Parish Council has agreed to put a final version of it to a vote. Copies will be available from the porch of the Church. Rule 11 of the Constitution requires that parishioners receive 21 days' notice of a meeting to adopt the Constitution. We therefore notify you that at each of the three masses on Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 July a member of the Parish Council will attend and conduct a vote by show of hands on the following resolutions:

"CALL NO-ONE FATHER"

(Matt. 23:9)

Presenter **Dr Berise Heasly** is the author of the recently published book "Call noone Father- Countering Clericalism in the Catholic Tradition." Berise describes herself as a "cradle Catholic and mother", and as "a student of theology but not a theologian."

In sharing her insights from a thoroughly researched treatment of the book's theme, she will draw upon her skills and long experience as a professional educator, and her sound grasp of the findings of the Second Vatican Council. Her PhD in education was on the teaching of virtues, values and ethics. She will put forward not merely the facts of clericalism but also practical approaches for countering it, knowing full well that simply confronting it head on will not do the job.

MACGEORGE LECTURE - 'How to End the History of Clerical Child Sexual Abuse in the Catholic Church' by Professor Nancy Scheper-Hughes

Never one to shy away from controversy, her talk will be based on three decades of studying and intervening in the global 'traffic in children' for sexual gratification by Catholic priests, bishops and cardinals.

Drawing on memoir, ethnography, Church history, Canon Law, and political theology, Professor Scheper-Hughes will explain the foundational causes, ugly consequences, and missed opportunities by the Vatican to end the clerical sexual abuse of children once and for all.

The School's own Dr Dave McDonald, a criminologist whose research explores institutional child sex abuse and the related Royal Commission, will act as a discussant and offer a local perspective.

Nancy Scheper-Hughes is Professor of Medical Anthropology at the University of California, Berkeley. Her work focuses on the anthropology of the body, hunger, illness, medicine, psychiatry, mental illness, suffering, violence, and genocide which has broad application beyond her field. For the last decade, Scheper-Hughes has been involved in study of global organ trafficking for transplant patients and she currently advises the World Health Organization in this capacity.

Among her most famous works are the books: Saints, Scholars and Schizophrenics: Mental Illness in Rural Ireland (1979), Death without Weeping: The Violence of Everyday life in Brazil (1993), Violence in War and Peace: An Anthology (2003), and Commodifying Bodies (2002). In addition to being an eminent scholar, she has been a life-long activist across a range of issues.



Faculty of Theology and Philosophy guest lecture: Professor Didier Pollefeyt, KU Leuven

Nazism as an attack on Monotheism: Ethics and theology after the Holocaust

The Holocaust casts a heavy shadow over the twenty-first century. The Nazi extermination camps radically call into question the very foundations of Christianity, modernity and the postmodern world. Pollefeyt's work challenges and critically reconstructs ethics and theology by bearing witness to the victims, as well as shedding light on the perpetrators and bystanders, thus providing the basis for a renewed Christian understanding of good and evil for our time.

Pollefeyt has developed a comprehensive and interdisciplinary post-Holocaust ethics and theology, charting questions at the heart of a new synthesis: our concepts of God, the human person and the (post)modern world, as well as our understanding of ecology, politics, education, sacred texts, Christology, interreligious dialogue, forgiveness and reconciliation and eschatology.

This lecture will engage with some of these issues as explored in his latest book.

Didier Pollefeyt is a Catholic theologian and full professor of the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium.

In the Faculty of Theology and Religious studies, he teaches catechetics, religious pedagogy, post-holocaust theology and Jewish-Christian dialogue. As Holocaust scholar, he works on an ethical and theological analysis of the Holocaust and the development of the foundations of 'ethics and theology after Auschwitz'. As chairman of the *Center for Peace Ethics*, he develops an analysis of the questions of evil, guilt, remembrance, forgiveness and reconciliation.

Didier Pollefeyt has published widely about the ethical and theological problems connected to the encounter of Judaism with Christianity. His latest book is *Ethics and Theology after the Holocaust* (Leuven, Peeters, 2018).
