

Sponsors have only to attend on the Confirmation Day. Families may choose which Confirmation Sunday they wish to attend.


Social Policy Connections Forum

Dr John D'Arcy May World religions: a force for war or global peace? Tuesday 17 September 7:30-9pm Yarra Theological Union Study Centre 34 Bedford Street Box Hill

Religiously fuelled violence is afflicting many countries, just as important democracies are threatened by rising nationalist movements and populism. How can world religions work together to oppose the misuse of religion to justify violence?

John D'Arcy May has drawn on half a century of debate and dialogue about the ways in which world religions can help maintain human rights, overcome



economic inequality, and prevent ecological destruction. In his new book, Pluralism & Peace: The Religions in Global Civil Society, May explores how the great traditions of Buddhism, Christianity, and Islam, along with the various religious traditions in the Pacific Islands, can forge societies of mutual respect and tolerance to advance the wellbeing of everyone.

Born in Melbourne, Dr John D'Arcy May has a distinguished academic career, which includes teaching at the Catholic Ecumenical Institute at the University of Münster, and undertaking the role of Ecumenical Research Officer with the Melanesian Council of Churches in PNG. He became Director of the Irish School of Ecumenics at Trinity College Dublin, later becoming Associate Professor of Interfaith Dialogue.







GETTING BACK



ON MISSION







The newly published book "Getting Back on Mission – Reforming our Church Together" is not just another tome about reforms needed in the Church. It gathers together systematically years of work by Catholics for Renewal pleading for reform and a proper place for the laity, female and male, in decision making. It also shows how the whole People of God can work together to make the Church a true sign of the Kingdom in the 21st century. It is being sent to Pope Francis and every bishop in Australia, and is being launched also overseas via the International Church Reform Network. It covers governance, authority & power, the priesthood, sacraments, liturgy, women in the church, leadership & ministry, civic issues, and much more. It is not just critique but a hope-filled roadmap for return to the Gospel mission.

Peter Johnstone (qualifications in Theology, plus long practical experience in governance with State, Commonwealth & not-for-profit bodies) will explain the strategy behind the release of this book and its intended role in pursuing reform. Fiona Lynch (20 years service in senior /exec roles in community service organizations, also a poet) will focus on the essential areas of reform, especially in governance and in the critical role of women. Peter Wilkinson (former missionary priest and co-author of an acclaimed research report on history of sexual abuse in the church) will discuss the book's important description of Plenary Council purposes, constraints and possibilities.
