

Centering Prayer at St Carthages

every Tuesday at 5:30 - 6:15 in the church beginning 11th February.

All are all welcome to attend our Centering Prayer sessions, every Tuesday from 5:30 - 6:15 pm in the church.

Centering prayer is simple. For twenty minutes, with the intention of being totally open and available to God, we practice kenosis or letting go, *if you find yourself thinking, let the thought go.* This process is helped by a special word of your choice, (mine is hope, but choose one for yourself that really appeals, some people use maranatha or Jesu). This word is repeated where necessary to 'tether the mind' if there is simply too much daydreaming.

At 5:30 pm we begin with a brief 'sharing from our day,' then listen to a short audio talk by Cynthia Bourgeault, (or Thomas Keating/Richard Rohr). Following this is a twenty-minute centering prayer session and we conclude with a short chant and brief sharing. We finish at 6:15.

Centering Prayer is a Christian contemplative form of meditation practice developed in the 1970s by three Trappist monks, (Fathers William Meninger, Basil Pennington and Thomas Keating), and furthered by contemporary mystic, writer and Episcopalian priest, Cynthia Bourgeault. The practise draws upon the contemplative heritage found within biblical scripture and Christian mystical writings such as the medieval classic *The Cloud of Unknowing*. Centering Prayer is distinct and differs from most other mediation approaches. Instead of relying on the power of focused attention, (such as concentrating on the flow of one's breath or repeating a mantra), the energy of one's *intention* becomes the primary reason for engaging the practice. In broad terms, that intention can be described as being totally open and available to God, all the way down the innermost point of one's being and deeper than one's usual sense of self. As Cynthia Bourgeault says: 'Through aligning with that intention, the simple method of Centering Prayer consists of 'letting go' of the endless stream of thoughts. As we practice this inner releasing, we may provide an opportunity for gentle rest, as well as the quiet, open attentiveness to divine reality itself.'
